

Aleyna Günay's practice revolves around re-contextualizing everyday objects to reveal the economic and societal forces influencing our surroundings. Her research-based work focuses on how systems and policies explicitly deconstruct the meaning we attribute to objects. She often exposes the power inherent in infrastructure, uncovering the intricate dynamics at play beneath the surface, and unveils the value of dynamic yet complex narratives within her own visual language.

Günay's exploration of infrastructure and narratives underscores the complex interplay between human agency and societal progress. As society becomes more reliant on automated processes, her work prompts us to consider the implications for human labor and control.

She produces work in a variety of mediums, including sculpture, writing, installation, video, and sound. Günay also creates avant-garde sounds and performances.

Clarion Call for exhibition text for ETH Klimarunde 2023

"We were a family living in a small village until yesterday"

It was not quite a long time ago, we decided to build small house from scratch. My little daughter Eloise was helping to collect biodegradable materials from the lands we were living in. We wanted to build anti eco-warfare habitat for our small family. Eloise and her sister Jung were 6 years old when we adopted her from the orphanage of a former civil defence centre in Norway. We never believed she fully understood our language but thanks to my partner, we created learning models for Jung. She was special cild with special material on her body.

That was the small recap of our family, since we don't have anyone living here except us, family is everything for us. Until yesterday, unfortunately. Our small family biohouse was located on Barents Sea Beach. When Jung woke us up, it was too late for everything. Because of a substance we smelled, we lost our consciousness for such a long time. Jung checked our body-time and it seemed like we were half-sleeping for years and years. Eloise and Jung went out of our house and we followed them. They were very courageous to take over the situation. After we were out four of us, we couldn't believe what we saw. According to Jung, she had the ability to see further than us. The field contractors discovered was located in the northern part of the Barents Sea, Norway in a water depth of 402 m. It was estimated to contain between 200 million and 500 million barrels of oil equivalent. They were drilling the well to a depth of 905m using a Leiv Eiriksson semi-submersible rig. And then Jung asked me; "What will we do right now, monnny? Eloise, added; "I want to know, what's happening?"

-"We are staying until they are giving up" Jung: "Perfect, exactly what I imagined"

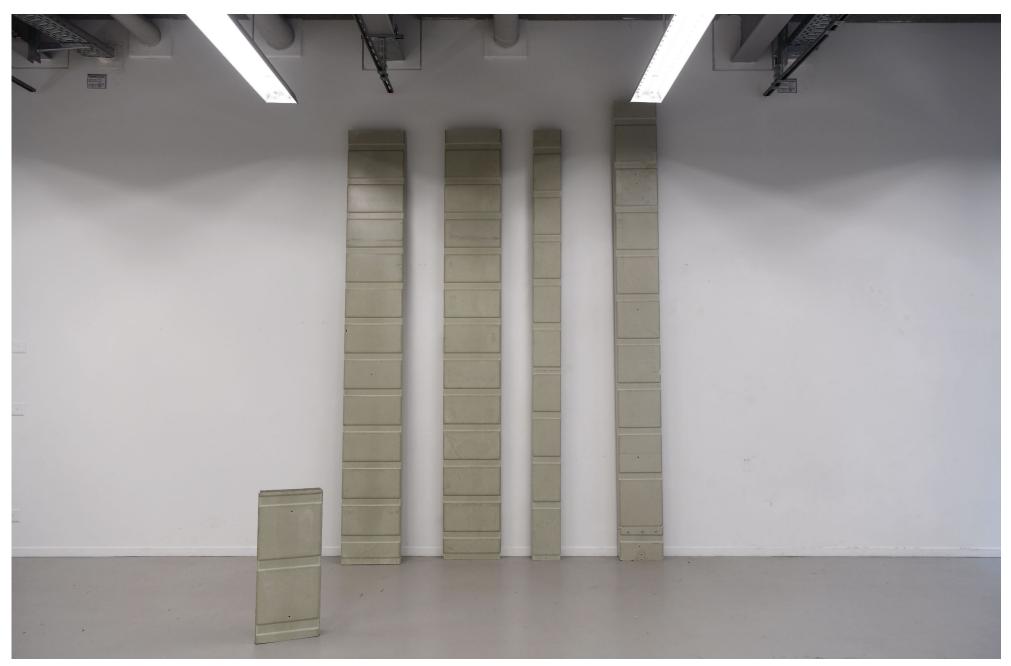

Integral Accidents Which May Someday Become Our Habitat, 2024 Fridge. metal, plastic. screws, wood, paint 150 x 60 x 10 cm

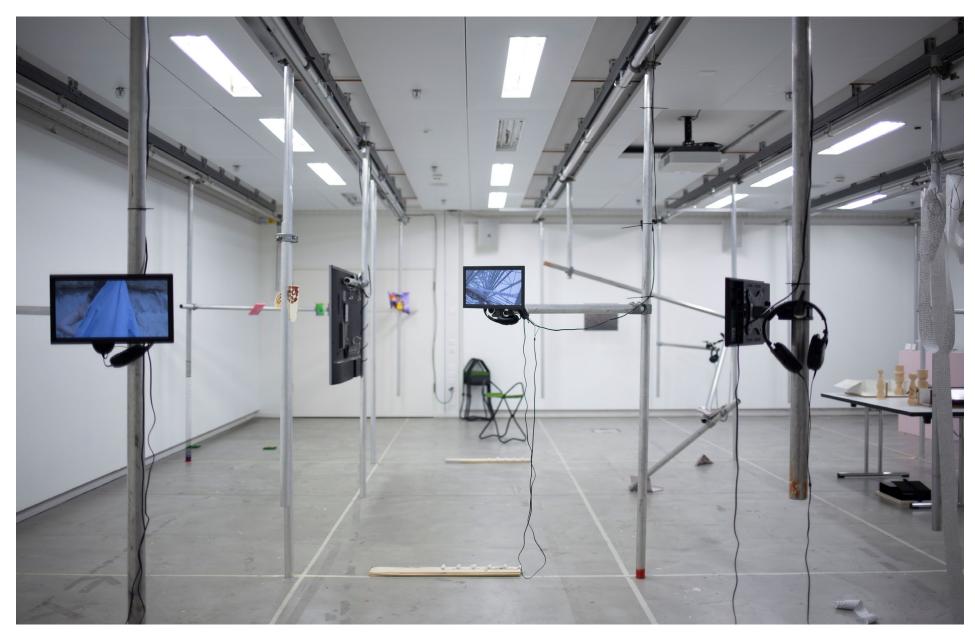


Language of the Youth (Stonewalling) 2024 Fiberglass covers Dimensions variable



Still Remain Human in the 31st Century, (05: 55) 2022 Two-Channel 4K Video, Sound Performance

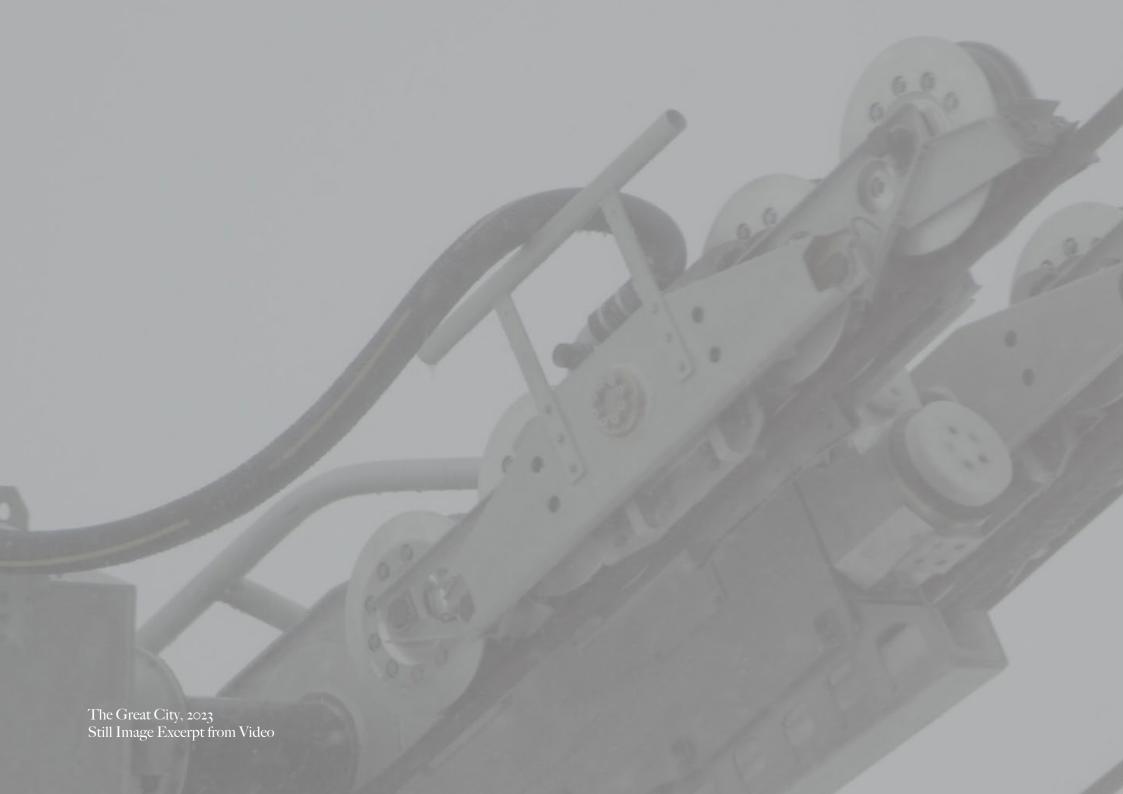

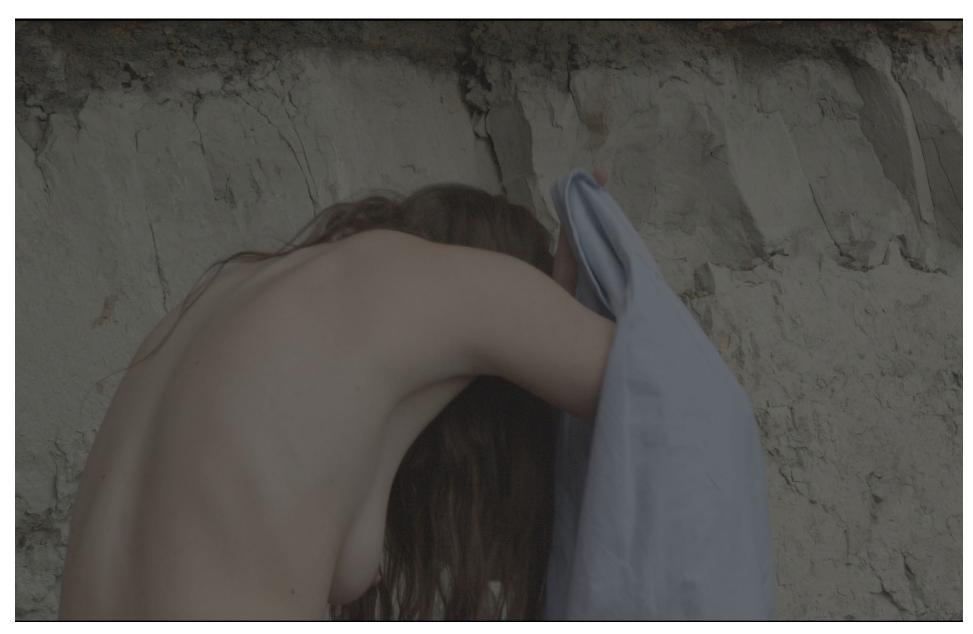


The Great City, 2023 Three-Channel 4k Video (12:20) Dimensions Variable

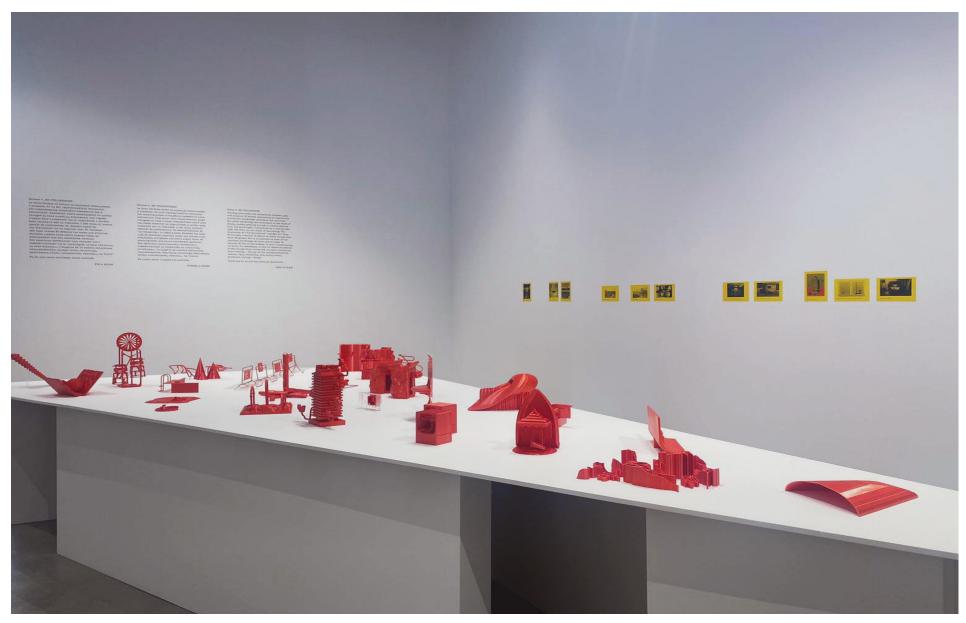
